Early Spring Caddisflies

Apataniidae (Little Mountain Casemakers)

Apatania (Early-smoky-winged sedge)

Larvae: in small rock cases of fine sediment; crème colored sz. 22-18

Adults: sz. 20-18 greyish-black wing

Philopotamidae (Finger-net caddisflies)

Chimarra (Little Black Caddisflies)

Larvae: constructing silk nets that become cover in brown detritus; larvae orange sz. 18-16. When lifting rocks, larvae become disoriented and leave nets making them appear free-living.

Adults: sz. 20-18 dark brown, black wings

Hydropsychidae (Net-spinning caddisflies)

Hydropsyche (Spotted caddis, Greater net spinners)

Larvae: sz. 16-14 green, tan, brown, brown; ventral abdominal gills

Adults: sz. 16 brown, tan, and brown-mottled wings

Cheumatopsyche (Lesser net spinners)

Larvae: sz. 18-16 tan bodied; ventral abdominal gills **Adults:** sz. 18-16 brown, brown-mottled, and grey wings,

Rhyacophilidae (Free-living caddisflies)

Rhyacophila (Free-living caddisflies)

Larvae: "The Green Rock Worm" sz. 18 (early instars)-sz. 12 (Late instars)

Adults: sz. 14-12 (mottled-dark brown wing)

Brachycentridae (Grannoms, Mother's day caddis, tiny black grannom caddis)

Micrasema (Tiny Black Grannom Caddis)

Larvae: silk, conical tube with or without plant material sz. 22-18; apple green

body occasionally

Adults: sz. 20-18 black winged; Apple colored body, All with black lateral stripe

down abdomen.

Brachycentrus (Gannoms, Mother's Day Caddis)

Larvae: extended pyramidal case of plant material in lines; sz. 18-14; apple green

body occasionally

Adults: sz. 16-12 brown wing; sometimes with brown or grey body. Occasionally

with green body. All with black lateral stripe down abdomen.
